OPEN PUBLIC MEETINGS ACT ANNOUNCEMENT

ROLLCALL

Resolutions: (17)

1. Recognizing and waiving certain restrictions during Mount Olive Week Carnival

The Carnival will be held July $13^{th} - 17^{th}$ with fireworks scheduled for July 15^{th} at 9:00 pm (rain date of July 16^{th}) and some restrictions need to be put in place related to parking and others waived regarding the noise ordinance and allowing overnight parking for the Carnival staff.

2. Authorizing the closing of Spring Street between Center St. and High St. July 3rd 2022, between 2pm and 9pm for the purpose of holding a block party (No rain date)

The residents of 34 High Street have requested a road closure to conduct a block party. The residents have signed a petition and are in favor of the road closure which has been reviewed and approved by the Police Department.

3. Authorizing the township to abate a nuisance property located at Block 1801, Lot 6.02 (50 Indian Spring Road)

The owner of 50 Indian Spring Road has failed to maintain the exterior of his property in accordance with the Township code. A notice of violation was issued, and the owner has not taken the property steps to abate the issue. The Township wishes to abate the nuisance and put a lien on the property.

4. Authorizing the sale of surplus property through public auction

The Township held a public auction of surplus property several weeks ago and was not able to auction off the computer equipment in bulk. A new auction will be held on individual IT equipment with a minimum bid of \$10 per piece.

5. Accepting the bid for the sale of certain municipal land and property from the Township Auction of June 14, 2022 (Block 3513, Lot 7 / 60 Mount Olive Road)

The Township held a public auction of real property on June 14, 2022 for the property known as 60 Mount Olive Road. The adjacent property owners were notified and a sole bid of \$7,505 was received. The properties will be merged and cannot be subdivided.

6. Authorizing the submission of a grant application and execution of a grant agreement with the New Jersey Department of Transportation for the rehabilitation of International Drive at Route 46 Project

The DOT has announced the 2023 Municipal Aid grant applications. An application will be submitted to continue the work along International Drive South and North near the Rt. 46 intersection along with making repairs to the bridge which spans across the railroad tracks.

7. Authorizing the execution of a contract and use of Open Space Funds for the purchase of 5 Pond View Lane (Block 6900, Lot 26) located in the Township of Mount Olive

In anticipation of closing on 5 Pond View Lane, authorizing the contract and utilizing the issuance of bonds to cover the purchase price in addition to open space funds for the due diligence is needed to complete the transaction. The resolution also authorizes the CFO to wire the funds to the tile company.

8. Requesting approval from the Director of the Division of Local Government Services for insertion of a specific item of revenue into the 2022 municipal budget (Strengthening Local Public Health Capacity Program FY 2023 for \$274,735)

The Township has been awarded the Strengthening Local Public Health Capacity grant which needs to be inserted into the budget and approved by the Director of the DLGS to be made available in the budget.

9. Requesting approval from the Director of the Division of Local Government Services for insertion of a specific item of revenue into the 2022 municipal budget (Vaccination Supplemental Funding FY 2022-2023 for \$50,000)

The Township has been awarded the Vaccination Supplemental Funding grant which needs to be inserted into the budget and approved by the Director of the DLGS to be made available in the budget.

10. Authorizing the award of a professional services agreement for Planning Board Engineer to Van Cleef Engineering Associates *REVISED - Certifying full contract amount

Now that the budget is adopted, the entire contract amount can be certified by the CFO of \$10,000 for the Planning Board Engineering with Van Cleef Engineering.

11. Authorizing change order No. 1 for Bid #08-2021 Roof Restoration – Part II Henry Seward House (Lewis-Graham, Inc.)

A no cost change order needs to be authorized for the Seward House project to extend the project completion date to September 30, 2022 due to various conditions related to supply chain and weather.

12. Authorizing change order No. 1 for Bid #09-2021 Phase IIIB: Interior Restoration and Rehabilitation of Mt. Olive Baptist Church (Lewis-Graham, Inc.)

A no cost change order needs to be authorized for the Baptist Church project to extend the project completion date to July 31, 2022 due to various conditions related to supply chain and weather.

13. Authorizing the award of contract for RFP #03-2022 Holiday Lights Festival Concession Services (HSH Property Management, LLC)

The Township solicited proposal for a holiday light festival concession service. One (1) proposal was received from HSH Property Management, LLC and the evaluation committee recommends the award of a contract. There will be no cost to the Township and the vendor will share 18% of all ticket sales revenue.

- 14. Authorizing the award of a one-year contract extension to Peterson & Sons Tree Service for Bid #15-2019 Tree Removal, Tree Trimming and Stump Grinding *REVISED Increase Amount Due to the Clover Hill Shade Tree and Sidewalk project, the contract amount with our tree removal contractor needs to be increased by \$18,000 to fulfill the remainder of the contract period bringing the total amount to \$60,000.
- 15. Awarding a "Non-Fair and Open" vendor service contract pursuant to 'Pay-to-Play' Law (Castle Printing)

The Township needs to acquire various printing services as a non-fair and open contract through Castle Printing not to exceed \$37,614.

- 16. Authorizing the renewal of Alcoholic Beverage Licenses for the 2022-2023 licensing period In accordance with the ABC laws, the attached liquor licenses have been filed with the Clerk's Office and reviewed by the Police Department and can be renewed for the following year.
- 17. Authorizing the Township Council to adjourn into Executive Session

Ordinance for Second Reading: (1)

Ord. #19-2022Amending section 3(e)(ii) of Bond Ordinance #7-2022 of the Township of Mount Olive, finally adopted April 6, 2022, in order to include an additional project

The 2022 bond ordinance needs to be amended to include an additional project, specifically the purchase of the new ambulance due to the increase in cost.

Ordinance for First Reading: (1)

Ord. #20-2022Amending section 550-23 of the Township Code to update and clarify zoning permit and certificate of occupancy requirements

The Township Planner/Zoning Official has recommended updating and clarifying certain requirements related to Zoning Permits and CO requirements. Specifically, adding language which requires a zoning permit and/or soil and fill importation permit related to site improvements, expanding the term "building" to include "accessory buildings and structures", and requiring a zoning permit and Planning Board approval for any building alternation when needed. In addition, certain fees which are no longer collected have been removed.

RESOLUTION OF THE TOWNSHIP COUNCIL OF THE TOWNSHIP OF MOUNT OLIVE RELATIVE TO MOUNT OLIVE WEEK CARNIVAL JULY 13TH THROUGH JULY 17TH 2022

WHEREAS, the Township's Recreation Department is planning what is to be known as the Mount Olive Week Carnival which will be conducted from July 13th to July 18th with fireworks scheduled for July 15th at approximately 9: 15 PM.; with a rain date of July 16th; and

WHEREAS, it is necessary to make some restrictions as to parking during these events and to waive certain other restrictions for the operations of the carnival; and

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Township Council of the Township of Mount Olive as follows:

- 1. The hours of operation of Turkey Brook Park shall be extended from sunset to 12:30 AM from Wednesday, July 13th through Sunday July 17th. The extension of park hours is required for the carnival and necessary nightly clean-up. The hours of the carnival are:
 - Wednesday July 13th from 6:00 PM to 11:00 PM
 - Thursday July 14th from 6:00 PM to 11:00 PM
 - Friday July 15th from 6:00 PM to 12:00 AM (Midnight)
 - Saturday July 16th from 3:00 PM to 12:00 AM (Midnight)
 - Sunday July 17th from 3:00 PM to 8:00 PM
 - Fireworks are planned for Friday July 15th at approximately 9:15 PM, in the event of rain for the fireworks, the Saturday carnival hours will be 3:00 PM to 12:00 AM (Midnight).
- 2. The Noise Ordinance which is applicable under normal circumstances shall be waived from a 10:00 PM to 12:00 AM (midnight) on Wednesday, July 13th and Thursday July 14th, and for Friday and Saturday rides ending at midnight, and clean up until 12:45 AM. Sunday, July 17th, rides end at 8pm. Noise may continue until 12:00 AM on July 17th as the Carnival breaks down.
- 3. Certain parking restrictions are necessary and appropriate under the circumstances and those restrictions will be in effect from Monday July 11th to Sunday July 17th:
 - a. Parking shall be restricted, limited, or prohibited, as directed or posted by the police department on local streets for the duration of this event.
 - b. There shall be no parking on:
 - Carson Road
 - Elias Drive
 - Delbar Drive
 - Pershing Avenue
 - Stanley Place

- Summit Avenue
- Sunset Drive
- Washington Street
- c. Vehicular traffic will be restricted on Friday July 15th or on July 16th in the event of the fireworks being postponed to Saturday due to rain on:
 - Wynnewood Avenue between Clinton Avenue and Flanders Road
 - Chelsea Avenue between Clinton Avenue and Flanders Road
- 4. The carnival company shall be allowed to park their RV's within Turkey Brook Park for the purpose of providing overnight sleeping accommodations for the Carnival staff; and
- 5. A temporary waiver to Section 285-9 of the Township Code which prohibits the posting, exhibiting and displaying of signs on Township property.

The words "Buyer" and "Seller" include all Buyers and Sellers listed above.

- 1. The Seller agrees to sell and the Buyer agrees to buy the property described in this contract.
 - 2. The purchase prices is \$7,505.
- 3. The property to be sold consists of: (a) the land and all buildings, other improvements and fixtures, if any, on the land; (b) all of the Seller's rights in the land.

 The property is shown on the municipal tax map in the Township of Mount Olive, County of Morris and State of New Jersey as Block 3513, Lot 6, 60 Mount Olive Road.
 - 4. The Buyer will pay the purchase price as follows:

At execution of this contract (10% of the minimum bid price) \$750

Balance to be paid at closing in cash or certified or bank cashier's check (this shall include the Buyer's premium of 10% of the bid of \$750)

- 5. The closing of title will be scheduled for not later than sixty (60) days from the date of this agreement, at the Municipal Town Hall, known as 204 Flanders-Drakestown Road, Budd Lake, NJ 07828, NJ between the hours of 9:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m.
- 6. In this sale, the Seller agrees to provide and the Buyer agrees to accept a "Quitclaim Deed" with a description that merely refers to lot and block numbers. If the Buyer

furnishes the Seller with a metes and bounds description and an adequate title commitment, then the sale shall be by Bargain and Sale Deed.

- 7. The property is sold "as is". Seller makes no warranties as to the condition or value of the property, including the presence or absence of wetlands or any other environmental condition.
 - 8. Buyer will be entitled to possession of the premises following the closing of title.
- 9. Conveyance shall be made subject to easements, zoning ordinance, and restrictions of record if any.

In the event the Township of Mount Olive is unable to convey clear and marketable title, insurable at regular rates by a title insurance company licensed to do business in the State of New Jersey, the Township will forthwith return to the purchaser any and all deposit moneys previously submitted by the purchaser, and neither party shall have any further rights against the other. The acceptance of a deed by the Buyer from the Township shall extinguish any and all claims that said purchaser may have against the Township of Mount Olive Township in connection with the guality of title conveyed.

- 11. The parties hereto acknowledge that no realtor has been involved in this transaction and no commissions are due.
- 12. The Seller represents that the property which is the subject matter of this contract may be a non-conforming lot by virtue of the zoning ordinance requirements of the Township of Mount Olive. The Buyer, by entering into this Agreement acknowledges such fact. If the Buyer is a contiguous property owner of the subject property, the subject property shall merge into the

Buyer's current lot. However, the property shall not be further subdivided as the conveyance is being made to accommodate the adjoining property owner as to his/her current residence, not for subdivision purposes. If the Buyer is not a contiguous property owner and if the subject property is a non-conforming lot by virtue of the zoning ordinance requirements of the Township of Mount Olive, the deed of conveyance will contain a restriction that the subject lot cannot be built upon. The sale of this property by the Township shall in no way be construed as an indication that building permits or any utilities such as water and/or sewer, can be secured for the property.

- 13. The property may be subject to easements, assessments, reservations, covenants and conditions of Lake and/or Property Owners Associations, if any.
- 14. All of the terms, covenants and conditions herein contained shall be for the benefit of and shall bind the respective parties, their heirs, executors, administrators, successors and assigns, respectively.

ORDINANCE AMENDING SECTION 3(e)(i) AND SECTION 3(e)(ii) OF BOND ORDINANCE #7-2022 OF THE TOWNSHIP OF MOUNT OLIVE, IN THE COUNTY OF MORRIS, NEW JERSEY, FINALLY ADOPTED APRIL 6, 2022, IN ORDER TO INCLUDE AN ADDITIONAL PROJECT.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE TOWNSHIP COUNCIL OF THE TOWNSHIP OF MOUNT OLIVE, IN THE COUNTY OF MORRIS, NEW JERSEY (not less than two-thirds of all members thereof affirmatively concurring) AS FOLLOWS:

Section One. Section 3(e)(i) of Bond Ordinance #7-2022 of the Township of Mount Olive, in the County of Morris, New Jersey (the "Township"), finally adopted April 6, 2022 ("Bond Ordinance #7-2022"), is hereby amended to include the acquisition of an ambulance and to read as follows:

"(i) Acquisition of personal protection equipment for Budd Lake Fire Department, a brush truck for Flanders Fire Department, laptops, tablets and Wi-Fi for Flanders Rescue Squad and a controlled air purifying respirator system and an ambulance for Budd Lake Rescue Squad, including all related costs and expenditures incidental thereto.

Section Two. Section 3(e)(ii) of Bond Ordinance #7-2022 of the Township, is hereby amended to include the acquisition of an ambulance and to read as follows:

"(ii) Replacement of Engine 53 and the acquisition of pagers for Budd Lake Fire Department, radios for Flanders Rescue Squad and an ambulance, radios, pagers and an ultra-violet light for Budd Lake Rescue Squad, including all related costs and expenditures incidental thereto."

Section Three. The Township hereby certifies that it has adopted a capital budget or a temporary capital budget, as applicable. The capital or temporary capital budget of the Township is hereby amended to conform with the provisions of this ordinance to the extent of any inconsistency herewith. To the extent that the purposes authorized herein

are inconsistent with the adopted capital or temporary capital budget, a revised capital or

temporary capital budget has been filed with the Division of Local Government Services.

Section Four. This ordinance shall take effect 20 days after the first publication

ORDINANCE #20-2022

AN ORDINANCE OF THE TOWNSHIP OF MOUNT OLIVE, IN THE COUNTY OF MORRIS AND STATE OF NEW JERSEY, AMENDING SECTION 550-23 OF THE TOWNSHIP CODE TO UPDATE AND CLARIFY ZONING PERMIT AND CERTIFICATE OF OCCUPANCY REQUIREMENTS

WHEREAS, Section 550-23 of the Township of Mount Olive Code sets forth requirements for zoning permits and certificates of occupancy; and

WHEREAS, the Township Planner and Administration have recommended updating and clarifying the requirements.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the Township Council of the Township of Mount Olive, in the County of Morris and State of New Jersey, as follows:

SECTION 1. Chapter 550, Land Use, Article III, General Administration; Building Construction; Permits, Section 550-23, Zoning permits and certificates of occupancy; fees, is hereby amended to read as follows in its entirety:

§ 550-23 Zoning permits and certificates of occupancy; fees.

- A. No zoning permit, building permit or certificate of occupancy shall be issued for any parcel of land or structure which was sold or on which improvements were undertaken in violation of the provisions of this chapter or for use of a lot which was created by subdivision after the effective date of and not in conformity with the provisions of this chapter. No site improvements, such as but not limited to additions, patios, decks, fences, detached garages, sheds, excavation or construction of public or private improvements, shall be commenced except in conformance with this chapter in accordance with plat approvals and the issuance of required permits, including a zoning permit, and/or where applicable, a soil and fill importation permit pursuant to Chapter 334 of the Township Code. - B. A zoning permit shall be issued by the Zoning Officer before the issuance of either a certificate of occupancy to a new occupant of an existing non-residential building or portions of an existing building or before the issuance of a building permit or certificate of occupancy.
- C. It shall be unlawful to use or permit the use of any building or part thereof hereafter created, erected, changed, converted, altered or enlarged, wholly or in part, until a certificate of occupancy shall have been issued by the Construction Code Official; and no certificate shall be issued unless the land, building(s), accessory buildings and structures, and use thereof comply with this chapter and is preceded by issuance of a zoning permit or by a memorialized resolution of approval by the Mount Olive Planning Board; all matters incorporated on the approved subdivision or site plan have been completed and certified by the Township Engineer; and the building and health

codes are complied with.

- D. Each request for a zoning permit and a certificate of occupancy shall be accompanied by a check payable to the Township of Mount Olive in the amount of \$25 for a residential zoning permit and \$100 for a nonresidential zoning permit. [Amended 6-15-2004 by Ord. No. 12-2004; 10-5-2010 by Ord. No. 23-2010]
- E. Where subject property is governed by rules and regulations of an association, the zoning permit application shall include documentation that said association has authorized the submission of the application for the proposed use and/or site improvement(s). [Added 11-10-2020 by Ord. No. 21-2020]
- **SECTION 2.** If any section, subsection, clause, or phrase of this Ordinance is for any reason held to be unconstitutional or invalid by any court of competent jurisdiction, such decision shall not affect the remaining portions of the Ordinance.
- **SECTION 3.** All ordinances or parts of ordinances of the Township of Mount Olive that are inconsistent herewith are repealed to the extent of such inconsistency.
- **SECTION 4.** This Ordinance shall take effect twenty (20) days following final passage, approval, and publication as required by law.

Tracking Aquatic Life Using Free-Floating Genetics

Understanding what aquatic animals live in our rivers can tell us volumes about the water quality. Traditionally, physical samples were needed to assess the species present and the abundance of those species. To assess fish populations, a crew of about 8 people use electricity to stun the fish (electro-fishing), net and collect them into buckets to be measured. identified, photographed and then returned to the river. It is precarious and labor-intensive work, and the potential for fish mortality is high. Some fish are so sensitive and quick, that as soon as they feel the electricity, they escape the stunning and netting. One such species is the American shad; a species that MWA is extremely interested in after the removal of several dams in the lower Musconetcong River. It is known that shad have returned to the River after an absence of over 300 years, but little else is known about this migratory herring. Are they spawning in the Musconetcong River? How many are making the migration? To what point are they swimming up river?

Another physical sampling that MWA's water quality team works on is collecting macroinvertebrates. These small aquatic insects can tell us about pollution levels through their presence or absence. Even though these critters are relatively easy to collect, high water conditions, like this spring, can make a true and representative sample hard to come by. In addition to the known, native insects, there are also invasive species, like New Zealand mudsnails, that can be present. They are extremely tiny (5mm) and can be easily overlooked, especially if numbers are low, due to a new infestation.


Enter environmental DNA (eDNA).

DNA is the hereditary material in organisms that contains the biological instructions for building and maintaining them. Each species has a unique pattern, providing a means to identify them. This DNA is consistently shed and released into the environment, you and I are shedding skin and hair as we speak. Fish and other aquatic organisms are doing the same thing in the water, and this can be detected in a water sample. The eDNA technology is relatively new, but old enough to have been through rigorous testing and refinement of techniques to become a viable data collection method at a reasonable price.

During 2020-2021, much of the water quality monitoring work of organizations and government agencies was curtailed or even canceled because of the pandemic. MWA started to think about ways to pivot and adapt. MWA has also been attempting to gather fish data surrounding the removal of the Hughesville dam, but have been unable to because of the pandemic and unusually high water conditions in 2019, hampering our ability to understand the impacts on fish communities. Research into alternative methods led many to the same conclusion, let's get eDNA up and running in a standardized manner that can be widely used for comparable and reliable data. It only takes a team of two, a water pump, and special filters to collect data.

This summer, MWA will be partnering with U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, NJ Department of Environmental Protection, NJ Fish and Wildlife Service, Rutgers University, and The Nature Conservancy to begin this process on the Musconetcong and Paulins Kill Rivers. A pilot study will be run to detect the

presence of adult and juvenile American shad, the presence or absence of the New Zealand mudsnail, macroinvertebrate communities, fish communities and other invasive species detection, such as the predatory snakehead fish. When we get the results of this data, it will be available on our new Data Dashboard on the MWA website, https://www.musconetcong.org/water-quality-data. Check out the water quality of your favorite fishing hole, kayaking spot or scenic hiking trail.

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
Volunteer Spotlight

River Clean-Up Results

This year, MWA celebrated its 30th annual River Clean-Up! Over 250 volunteers cleaned up the watershed at sites from Lake Hopatcong down to where the Musky meets the Delaware River. Volunteers collected nearly 170 bags of trash and recyclables and reached a total of 650 service hours that MWA can use as matching support on grant applications.

New this year, we asked volunteers to specify specific types of trash to show trends in what gets dumped each year. Volunteers reported 235 plastic drink bottles, 197 metal drink cans, 92 plastic bags, and other troublesome trash items, including chairs, clothes, foam, cigarettes, and more.

MWA Celebrates Earth Day with Congressman Malinowski

Earth Day was established over 50 years ago with a goal of creating awareness for environmental issues and threats and to inspire stewardship nationally.

Each year, for the past 30 years, MWA has hosted a watershed-wide clean-up in April. While it hasn't traditionally been held on Earth Day, it is our largest day of volunteerism to date and removes hundreds of bags of trash from the Musconetcong River.

This year, MWA scheduled a second clean-up in April, and worked with Congressman Malinowski as well as partners from the Coalition for the Delaware River Watershed to clean up a known hot spot for dumping near the River. Together, this group cleaned up nearly a dozen bags of trash and large items, including a mattress, three arm chairs, and a pickup truck cap from a popular fishing access point in Bloomsbury.

This group continued Earth Day celebrations at the historic Asbury Mill site, where everyone was joined by representatives from the Ramapough Culture and Land Foundation who gave a prayer and a blessing to the River.

The Congressman remarked on how he intends to continue to work to preserve the history and culture of the Musconetcong Watershed, and is proud to support MWA's new grant through the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, titled "Linking Up the Landscape," which will bring together recreational experiences and learning opportunities about the region's significant resources, by developing online maps, an interpretive plan, and communications materials, highlighting the natural, cultural, historic, and prehistoric sites along the Musconetcong Watershed National Water Trail.

The project, headed by MWA, will work in partnership with the Ramapough Culture and Land Foundation to educate locals and visitors about this region's history in many ways, including by installing interpretive signs that will be translated in both English and Lenape.

Congressman Malinowksi has been a champion of the Delaware River Basin Restoration Program, which last year,

provided about \$10 million in federal grants from the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service for habitat restoration and recreation projects. MWA advocated for the creation of this program, through serving on the Steering Committee of Coalition for the Delaware River Watershed. MWA has won three grants from this federal fund since it was founded in 2019.

Global Threats Impacting the Musconetcong River

Most of MWA's work focuses within the boundaries of the Musconetcong watershed, so it is easy to overlook the impact that global threats to the environment have on our watershed. Climate change is one such issue, and we already see its impacts trickling into our creeks and streams. Concerned citizens often want to find a solution to the larger problems at hand, but solutions may be more easily attainable if approached at a community level. River Watcher volunteers who care about the wellbeing of the Musky in the face of environmental threats, devote their time to being trained in macroinvertebrate identification and habitat assessment. By collecting this data, we will have more documentation of how the River's ecosystem shifts over time as the impacts of climate change become more apparent.

Aquatic macroinvertebrates are small organisms that lack a backbone, but are large enough to be seen with the naked eye. They include snails, clams, worms, and insects in their larval and nymph stages. Macroinvertebrates play a major role in a river ecosystem's food web. Living in the streambed, they work to break down organic material and contribute to the cycling of nutrients throughout the river. Macroinvertebrates also are an important food source for fish, birds, and amphibians. The presence of macroinvertebrates indicates a functioning food web, but the biodiversity, and presence of certain orders of macros. can serve as an indicator of water quality.

The macroinvertebrates we sample can be divided into three groups: pollution intolerant, pollution sensitive, and pollution tolerant. If pollution intolerant macros, like stoneflies, mayflies, and caddisflies, are present in a certain area, it indicates that the water they live in must have low pollution. A site that only has pollution tolerant macros like black flies and midge flies may be teeming with life, but the absence of the intolerant and sensitive macros indicates that the water quality may not be as high.

Unfortunately, the consequences of climate change are already starting to impact the habitat that macroinvertebrates rely on for survival. One of which is the increased frequency of heavy rainfall

events. According to an EPA document on climate change, "[the] average annual precipitation in New Jersey has increased 5 to 10 percent in the last century, and precipitation from extremely heavy storms has increased 70 percent in the Northeast since 1958." High rainfall events increase the speed and volume of water flowing in the stream, and cause more frequent flooding. In September 2021, the rain associated with Hurricane Ida caused an upsurge in flow from the River's typical level of about 250 cubic feet per second (cfs) up to 7,000 cfs, which resulted in increased flooding throughout the watershed. Besides being a threat to property and human life, high flow events bring much wear and tear to the Musky's stream morphology, which negatively impacts the organisms that live there.

Macroinvertebrates are abundant in stretches of stream that are composed of larger rocks, like cobbles and boulders, in the streambed. With high flow comes more opportunity for these larger rocks to be disturbed, thus disrupting the organisms that rely on that habitat to thrive. Fine sediment, like sand and silt, also gets disturbed and suspended in the water column. This is why the River looks murky after heavy rain. The suspended sediment eventually settles and can be deposited in areas that typically have ample, rocky habitat for macroinvertebrates. This settling of sediment over previously ideal habitat will bury any macroinvertebrates living there, making survival more difficult. With more fine sediment settling throughout the stream bed more frequently, less macroinvertebrates will survive.

While April has always been known for its showers, this April far exceeded expectations – with two major rainfall events causing stream flow to surge over 1000 cfs. The water quality team and River Watchers managed to take advantage of small windows of time with low flow to wade in the stream and collect macroinvertebrate samples. Some volunteers found it difficult to

locate macros in certain sites as there were more frequent areas of deposited sediment. The high flow events also had the potential to disrupt the number of macros that remained in certain sites. As sampling was slated to continue into May, heavy rain and high flow continues to push back the ability to collect samples.

More data is needed to determine the impact that more frequent rain events, as a result of climate change, have on the assemblages of macroinvertebrates present in the stream. This will be possible when comparing macroinvertebrate samples, habitat assessment, and flow data from year to year. Since macroinvertebrates are such important water quality indicators, in terms of pollution, it is necessary to understand how the frequency of high flow events impact these organisms so that they can continue to indicate water quality for years to come.

Is there anyone who doesn't want to live in a safe area in a beautiful location, where everything they need is close at hand? Of course not. Everyone wants to live in an environment where they will not only survive, but thrive. But this impulse isn't exclusive to people; it's shared by all animals. And as it turns out Northwestern New Jersey is the ideal location for many species of animals, including stream-dwelling trout. The rolling, tumbling, rippling streams and rivers—sustained by headwaters and fed from below with cool, clean groundwater-provide trout in this region with everything they need.

All Within Easy Reach

Like all fish, trout have three primary needs: oxygen, food, and shelter (from predators, and to conserve energy). With their rocky margins and stony beds, the waters of the Highlands have a variety of features and characteristics that offer all of these—in abundance:


Riffles: Areas where shallow water cascades visibly over rocks, and spills into deeper water below. These churning, bubbling waters are especially well-oxygenated, and attract all kinds of insects for trout to eat. Their large rocks offer many places to hide and to rest.

Runs: Found below riffles, with deeper water and a smooth, steady current. Runs are a great place to grab an easy meal – as insects drift into the path of trout waiting at the edge of the current or resting on the bottom—and to escape predators.

Eddys: Pockets of swirling water, formed when a current meets an obstruction, like fallen logs, debris, manmade structures, large rocks—even a stream's own banks. Insects trapped in an eddy make an all-you-can-eat buffet for feeding trout.

Made in the Shade

All fish need oxygen, food, and shelter but when it comes to an ideal environment, trout are fussier than other fish. They do best in cool water (between 45 and 65 degrees) so to survive the warmth of a New Jersey summer, trout (like many of us) look for places to beat the heat. Fortunately, the rivers and

such refuges. Above the surface, the shadowy ravines and shady forests rise among and flow through to help keep trout comfortable all summer long. Below the surface, springs and seeps in the surrounding bedrock continually supply local surface waters with clean temperate groundwater. With an average temperature of 52 degrees, this groundwater not only keeps things cool all summer long, it also creates

winter.

Keeping adult fish alive and healthy is only part of the equation. To maintain a robust wild population, trout also need good places to spawn, and for baby fish to mature.

Like other species, trout instinctively travel upstream to reproduce. In our region, they seek out the many smaller headwater streams at the roots of the watershed. These headwaters, often remote and undisturbed, make excellent spawning and nursery grounds. These waters and the surrounding terrain offer reproducing adults and their eggs shelter from predators. During hatching season, they offer young fry a safe place to grow up, and an ample supply of insects for food.

There Goes the Neighborhood

Unfortunately, Northwestern New Jersey's valuable trout streams face many challenges. State regulations designed to protect them are frequently overlooked or disregarded, and contain easily exploited loopholes that defeat their very purpose. As a result, destructive development activity near our surface waters is causing harmful erosion and sediment to build up. Unfiltered stormwater is washing into streams, depleting them of oxygen and raising their temperature. Projects are being proposed that require the filling and paving over of small headwater streams.



Tracking Flows in the Musky


From storms that caused flash flood warnings throughout the State to steady rainfall overall, this Spring has been a wet one for the watershed. Along with heavy rainfall was increased flow in the River, leading to several canceled monitoring days. Thankfully, MWA's River Watchers are planning for a busy summer of monitoring indicators of water quality in the River, including macroinvertebrates and temperature.

MWA keeps a link to our U.S. Geological Survey gage in Bloomsbury, which is a good indicator of when the

best times are to fish or paddle the Musky. You can view this gage by visiting our website and clicking the "USGS Gage" link under the "Explore

Susceptibility Ratings for Netcong Water Department Sources

The table below illustrates the susceptibility ratings for the seven contaminant categories (and radon) for each source in the system. The table provides the number of wells and intakes that rated high (H), medium (M), or low (L) for each contaminant category. For susceptibility ratings of purchased water, refer to the specific water system's source water assessment report.

The seven contaminant categories are defined at the bottom of this page. DEP considered all surface water highly susceptible to pathogens, therefore all intakes received a high rating for the pathogen category. For the purpose of Source Water Assessment Program, radionuclides are more of a concern for ground water than surface water. As a result, surface water intakes' susceptibility to radionuclides was not determined and they all received a low rating.

If a system is rated highly susceptible for a contaminant category, it does not mean a customer is or will be consuming contaminated drinking water. The rating reflects the <u>potential</u> for contamination of source water, not the existence of contamination. Public water systems are required to monitor for regulated contaminants and to install treatment if any contaminants are detected at frequencies and concentrations above allowable levels. As a result of the assessments, DEP may customize (change existing) monitoring schedules based on the susceptibility ratings.

Pathogens: Disease-causing organisms such as bacteria and viruses. Common sources are animal and human fecal wastes.

Nutrients: Compounds, minerals and elements that aid growth, that are both naturally occurring and man-made. Examples include nitrogen and phosphorus. Volatile Organic Compounds: Man-made chemicals used as solvents, degreasers, and gasoline components. Examples include benzene, methyl tertiary butyl ether (MTBE), and vinyl chloride.

Pesticides: Man-made chemicals used to control pests, weeds and fungus. Common sources include land application and manufacturing centers of pesticides Examples include herbicides such as atrazine, and insecticides such as chlordane.

Inorganics: Mineral-based compounds that are both naturally occurring and man-made. Examples include arsenic, asbestos, copper, lead, and nitrate.

Radionuclides: Radioactive substances that are both naturally occurring and man-made. Examples include radium and uranium.

Radon: Colorless, odorless, cancer-causing gas that occurs naturally in the environment. For more information go to http://www.ni.gov/dep/rpp/radon/index.htm or call (800) 648-0394.

Disinfection Byproduct Precursors: A common source is naturally occurring organic matter in surface water. Disinfection byproducts are formed when the disinfectants (usually chlorine) used to kill pathogens react with dissolved organic material (for example leaves) present in surface water.

IMPORTANT INFORMATION ABOUT OUR DRINKING WATER

Missed Monitoring for Perfluorooctanoic Acid (PFOA) and Perfluorooctane Sulfonate Acid (PFOS) and Perfluorononanoic Acid (PFNA) During the 2nd Quarter of 2021

The Netcong Borough Water Department recently violated a drinking water standard. Although this was not emergency, as our customers you have a right to know what happened. We are required to monitor your drinking water for specific contaminants on a regular basis. Results of regular monitoring are an indicator of whether, or not the drinking water meets health standards. We inadvertently missed monitoring for the contaminants listed above during the 2nd quarter of 2021 at two of our water treatment plants. We did monitor correctly during the other three quarters of 2021. Those results are reflected in the "Test Results" table. We had no detections of Perfluorononanoic Acid (PFNA).

We at the Netcong Borough Water Department work hard to provide top quality water to every tap. We ask that all our customers help us protect our water sources, which are the heart of our community, our way of life and our children's future. Please call our office if you have questions.

Waivers: The Safe Drinking Water Act regulations allow monitoring waivers to reduce or eliminate the monitoring requirements for asbestos, volatile organic chemicals and synthetic organic chemicals. Our system received monitoring waivers for asbestos and synthetic organic chemicals.

Sources of Lead in Drinking Water

The Netcong Borough Water Department is responsible for providing high quality drinking water but cannot control the variety of materials used in plumbing components. Although most lead exposure occurs from inhaling dust or from contaminated soil, or when children eat paint chips, the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (USEPA) estimates that 10 to 20 percent of human exposure to lead may come from lead in drinking water. Infants who consume mostly mixed formula can receive 40 percent to 60 percent of their exposure to lead from drinking water. Lead is rarely found in the source of your drinking water but enters tap water through corrosion, or wearing away, of materials containing lead in the water distribution system and household plumbing materials. These materials include lead-based solder used to join copper pipes, brass, and chrome-brass faucets, and in some cases, service lines made of or lined with lead. New brass faucets, fittings, and valves, including those advertised as "lead-free", may still contain a small percentage of lead, and contribute lead to drinking water. The law currently allows end-use brass fixtures, such as faucets, with up to 0.25 percent lead to be labeled as "lead free". However, prior to January 4, 2014, "lead free" allowed up to 8 percent lead content of the wetted surfaces of plumbing products including those labeled National Sanitation Foundation (NSF) certified. Visit the NSF website at www.nsf.org to learn more about lead-containing plumbing fixtures. Consumers should be aware of this when choosing fixtures and take appropriate precautions. When water stands in lead service lines, lead pipes, or plumbing systems containing lead for several hours or more, the lead may dissolve into your drinking water. This means the first water drawn from the tap in the morning, or later in the afternoon if the water has not been used all day, can contain fairly high levels of lead.

Steps You Can Take to Reduce Exposure to Lead in Drinking Water

Run the cold water to flush out lead. Let the water run from the tap before using it for drinking or cooking any time the water in the faucet has gone unused for more than six hours. The longer the water resides in plumbing the more lead it may contain. Flushing the tap means running the cold-water faucet. Let the water run from the cold-water tap based on the length of the lead service line and the plumbing configuration in your home. In other words, the larger the home or building and the greater the distance to the water main (in the street), the more water it will take to flush properly. Although toilet flushing or showering flushes water through a portion of the plumbing system, you still need to flush the water in each faucet before using it for drinking or cooking. Flushing tap water is a simple and inexpensive measure you can take to protect your health. It usually uses less than one gallon of water.

Use cold, flushed water for cooking and preparing baby formula. Because lead from lead-containing plumbing materials and pipes can dissolve into hot water more easily than cold water, never drink, cook, or prepare beverages including baby formula using hot water from the tap. If you have not had your water sampled or if you know, it is recommended that bottled or filtered water be used for drinking and preparing baby formula. If you need hot water, draw water from the cold tap and then heat it.

Do not boil water to remove lead. Boiling water will not reduce lead; however, it is still safe to wash dishes and do laundry. Lead will not soak into dishware or most clothes.

Use alternative sources or treatment of water. You may want to consider purchasing bottled water or a water filter. Read the package to be sure the filter is approved to reduce lead or contact NSF International at 800-NSF-8010 or www.nsf.org for information on performance standards for water filters.

Determine if you have interior lead plumbing or solder. If your home/building was constructed prior to 1987, it is important to determine if interior lead solder or lead pipes are present. You can check yourself, hire a licensed plumber, or check with your landlord.

Replace plumbing fixtures and service lines containing lead. Replace brass faucets, fittings, and valves that do not meet the current definition of "lead free" from 2014 (as explained above). Visit the NSF website at www.nsf.org to learn more about lead-containing plumbing fixtures. Remove and clean aerators/screens on plumbing fixtures. Over time, particles and sediment can collect in the aerator screen. Regularly remove and clean aerators screens located at the tip of faucets and remove any particles.

Test your water for lead. Please call 973-347-6664 to find out how to get your water tested for lead. Testing is essential because you cannot see, taste, or smell lead in drinking water.

Get your child tested. Contact your local health department or healthcare provider to find out how you can get your child tested for lead if you are concerned about lead exposure. New Jersey law requires that children be tested for lead in their blood at both 1 and 2 years of age and before they are 6 years old if they have never been tested before or if they have been exposed to a known source of lead.

Have an electrician check your wiring. If grounding wires from the electrical system are attached to your pipes, corrosion may be greater. Check with a licensed electrician or your local electrical code to determine if your wiring can be grounded elsewhere. DO NOT attempt to change the wiring yourself because improper grounding can cause electrical shock and fire hazards.

Water softeners and reverse osmosis units will remove lead from water but can also make the water more corrosive to lead solder and plumbing by removing certain minerals; therefore, the installation of these treatment units at the point of entry into homes with lead plumbing should only be done under supervision of a qualified water treatment professional.

Health Effects of Lead

Lead can cause serious health problems if too much enters your body from drinking water or other sources. It can cause damage to the brain and kidneys and can interfere with the production of red blood cells that carry oxygen to all parts of your body. The greatest risk of lead exposure is to infants, young children, and pregnant women. Scientists have linked the effects of lead on the brain with lowered IQ in children. Adults with kidney problems and high blood pressure can be affected by low levels of lead more than healthy adults. Lead is stored in the bones, and it can be released later in life. During pregnancy, the child receives lead from the mother's bones, which may affect brain development. Contact your local health department or healthcare provider to find out how you can get your child tested for lead if you are concerned about lead exposure. You can find out more about how to get your child tested and how to pay for it at https://www.state.nj.us/health/childhoodlead/testing.shtml.

In July 2021, P.L.2021, Ch.183 (Law) was enacted, requiring all community water systems to replace lead service lines in their service area within 10 years. Under the law, the Netcong Borough Water Department is required to notify customers, non-paying consumers, and any off-site owner of a property (e.g., landlord) when it is known they are served by a lead service line*. Our service line inventory is available upon request.

We exceeded the Secondary Recommended Upper Limit (RUL) for Sodium. For healthy individuals the sodium intake from water is not important, because a much greater intake of sodium takes place from salt in the diet. However, sodium levels above the Recommended Upper Limit (RUL) may be of concern to individuals on a sodium restricted diet.

<u>Secondary Contaminant-</u> Substances that do not have an impact on health. Secondary Contaminants affect aesthetic qualities such as odor, taste or appearance. Secondary standards are recommendations, not mandates.

Recommended Upper Limit (RUL) - Recommended maximum concentration of secondary contaminants. These reflect aesthetic qualities such as odor, taste or appearance. RUL's are recommendations, not mandates

The Netcong Borough Water Department routinely monitors for over 80 contaminants in your drinking water according to Federal and State laws. This table lists only detected contaminants and shows the results of our monitoring from January 1st to December 31st, 2021. The state allows us to monitor for some contaminants less than once per year because the concentrations of these contaminants do not change frequently. Some of our data, though representative, are more than one year old.

Potential sources of drinking water contamination: The sources of drinking water (both tap water and bottled water) include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds reservoirs, springs, and wells. As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally occurring minerals and, in some cases, radioactive material, and can pick up substances resulting from the presence of animals or from human activity.

Contaminants that may be present in source water include:

- Microbial contaminants, such as viruses and bacteria, which may come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agricultural livestock operations, and wildlife.
- Inorganic contaminants, such as lasts and metals, which can be naturally-occurring or result from urban storm water runoff, industrial
 or domestic wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining, or farming.
- Pesticides and herbicides, which may come from a variety of sources such as agriculture, urban storm water runoff, and residential uses
- Organic chemical contaminants, including synthetic and volatile organic chemicals, which are byproducts of industrial processes and
 petroleum production, and can, also come from gas stations, urban storm water runoff, and septic systems.
- Radioactive Contaminants, which can be naturally occurring or be the result of oil and gas production and mining activities.

In order to ensure that tap water is safe to drink, EPA prescribes regulations which limit the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems. Food and Drug Administration regulations establish limits for contaminants in bottled water, which must provide the same protection for public health.

Drinking water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that the water poses a health risk. Definitions:

In the "Test Results' table you may find some terms and abbreviations you might not be familiar with. To help you better understand these terms we've provided the following definitions:

Non-Detects (ND) - laboratory analysis indicates that the constituent is not present.

Parts per million (ppm) or Milligrams per liter (mg/l) - one part per million corresponds to one minute in two years or a single penny in \$10,000. Parts per billion (ppb) or Micrograms per liter - one part per billion corresponds to one minute in 2,000 years, or a single penny in \$10,000,000. Parts per trillion (ppt) or nanogram per liter - one part per trillion corresponds to one minute in 20,000 years, or a single penny in \$100,000,000. Action Level - the concentration of a contaminant, which if exceeded, triggers treatment or other requirements, which a water system must follow.

Treatment Technique (TT) - A treatment technique is a required process intended to reduce the level of a contaminant in drinking water.

Maximum Contaminant Level - The "Maximum Allowed" (MCL) is the highest level of a contaminant that is allowed in drinking water. MCLs are set as close to the MCLGs as feasible using the best available treatment technology.

Maximum Contaminant Level Goal -The "Goal" (MCLG) is the level of a contaminant in drinking water below which there is no known or expected risk to

health. MCLGs allow for a margin of safety.

<u>Maximum Residual Disinfectant Level (MRDL)</u>. The highest level of a disinfectant allowed in drinking water. There is convincing evidence that addition of a disinfectant is necessary for control of microbial contaminants.

Maximum Residual Disinfectant Level Goal (MRDLG) - The level of a drinking water disinfectant, below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MRDLGs do not reflect the benefits of the use of disinfectants to control microbial contamination.

What are PFOA and PFOS?

Perfluorooctanoic acid (PFOA) and perfluorooctane sulfonate (PFOS) are per- and polyfluoroalkyl substances (PFAS), previously referred to as perfluorinated compounds, or PFCs, that are man-made and used in industrial and commercial applications. PFOA was used as a processing aid in the manufacture of fluoropolymers used in non-stick cookware and other products, as well as other commercial and industrial uses based on its resistance to harsh chemicals and high temperatures. PFOS is used in metal plating and finishing as well as in various commercial products. PFOS was previously used as a major ingredient in aqueous film forming foams for firefighting and training, and PFOA and PFOS are found in consumer products such as stain resistant coatings for upholstery and carpets, water resistant outdoor clothing, and grease proof food packaging. Although the use of PFOA and PFOS has decreased substantially, contamination is expected to continue indefinitely because these substances are extremely persistent in the environment and are soluble and mobile in water. Our water source: Our water source is wells. Our wells draw groundwater from the Delaware Water Basin, and range in depth from 88 to 240 feet. We have an interconnection with the Stanhope Borough Water Department for emergencies. The New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection (NJDEP) has completed and issued the Source Water Assessment Report and Summary for this water system, which is available at www.state.nj.us/dep/swap or by contacting NJDEP's Bureau of Safe Drinking Water at (609) 292-5550. You may also contact your public water system at 973-347-6664. Netcong Borough Water Department's source water susceptibility ratings and potential contaminant sources is included.



Murphy Administration Launches Healthy Community Planning New Jersey Website to Assist Municipalities in Understanding and Addressing Environmental Threats to Public Health

Date Correction - Funding Opportunity! Natural Climate Solutions Grant Last week's update incorrectly stated grant applications were due July 13. The grant applications are due August 15.

The Murphy Administration launched a new blue and green carbon grant program that will invest \$15 million in projects across New Jersey that create, restore and enhance salt marshes, sea grass beds, forests and urban parks that sequester atmospheric carbon in the fight against climate change.

Project grant awards will range from \$250,000 to \$5 million. Applicants for blue and green carbon grants should demonstrate that the projects will reduce greenhouse gas emissions by increasing carbon storage capacity in biomass (i.e., trees and plants) and soils, will reduce methane and nitrous oxide emissions caused by increasing salinity of coastal waters or changing land use, and will reduce carbon dioxide emissions by preventing soil loss.

For those interested in submitting applications for the Natural Climate Solutions (NCS) Grant Program, there is a <u>new FAQ document</u> that can be found on the <u>NCS Webpage</u>.

On January 21, 2020, the Dirty Dirt Law was enacted expanding the requirement for background checks and licensure, previously required only of persons engaged in the solid or hazardous waste industries (commonly referred to as an "A-901 License"), to persons engaged in soil and fill recycling service industries. This law was enacted to help address the increase in misrepresentation and dumping of tainted fill throughout the State and because of the widespread abuse, was designed to be enforced by both the State's civil enforcement programs (NJDEP and delegated CEHA agencies) as well as the local, county and state police agencies. Below is pertinent information to assist in understanding and enforcing these provisions:

- All businesses that are currently engaged in soil and fill recycling services, defined as the "collection, transportation, processing, brokering, storage, purchase, sale or disposition, or any combination thereof, of soil and fill recyclable materials", have <u>until July 14, 2022</u> to complete a 'Soil and Fill Recycling Registration Form' and submit to the NJDEP. The registration protects their rights to continue engaging in soil and fill recycling services pending submission of a formal application, review, and issuance/denial of an A-901 Soil and Fill Recyclables License ('license'). This process can take more than a year depending on the complexity of the business structure, number of key employees, and volume of applications.
- By no later than July 14, 2022 businesses currently engaged in soil and fill recycling services are required to either: Submit a formal application for an A-901 Soil and Fill Recyclables License, or if applicable, submit a formal certification that they only handle 'non-restricted soil and fill recyclable materials' as defined below, (with an annual certification thereafter). Applicable only to business entities that timely register by the above July 14, 2022 date, the Department is considering a potential extension to the deadline to submit the formal application for the A-901 Soil and Fill Recyclables License until after promulgation of the amended rule, however this does not affect the requirement to comply with the registration deadline.
- After the July 14, 2022 date, any business (either a new business, or an existing business that failed to
 register and/or submit a license application or non-restricted soil and fill recyclable materials certification)
 determined to be in violation is eligible for civil or criminal sanctions, and precluded from engaging in
 the soil and fill recycling services until they receive a full license or certify that they only handle nonrestricted soil and fill recyclable materials.
- Businesses that generate or handle de-minimis (low volume) quantities of non-restricted soil and fill recyclable materials in accordance with the below criteria do not have to register, nor obtain a license or a non-restricted soil and fill materials certification.
- To meet the de minimis quantity criteria, the business must determine that it will:
 - o Generate less than fifteen (15) cubic yards of non-restricted soil and fill recyclable materials each business day;
 - Use a truck or trailer that has a loading capacity of less than fifteen (15) cubic yards for transport of non-restricted soil and fill recyclable materials;
 - o Maintain a storage yard containing less than 100 cubic yards of non-restricted soil and fill recyclable materials; and
 - Maintain appropriate records and makes these available to the Department or delegated agencies upon request to prove they meet the above criteria.
- 'Non-restricted soil and fill recyclable materials' are soils and fills that do not contain debris (trash, wood, metals, plastics, wire, wallboard, roofing materials, insulation, carpets/padding, sewage, etc.) nor are chemically contaminated to the level that it meets the definition of a solid waste (determined per N.J.A.C. 7:26-1.6(a)6 to contain concentrations of one or more contaminants that exceed the residential soil remediation standards identified therein). Businesses can certify that they exclusively handle non-

restricted soil and fill recyclable materials and not have to apply for the formal license. As has always been the case, soil and fill materials containing debris are solid wastes, cannot be used as soil or fill aggregate substitute and must be disposed of at an approved solid waste disposal facility.

- NJDEP will be posting on its web page a running list of businesses that have registered, applied for a license, or submitted a non-restricted soil and fill recyclable materials certification for compliance status determinations. This listing is also for use by the general public to ascertain if businesses soliciting soil and fill services have submitted the required information to the NJDEP.
- Soil and fill materials are usually generated from land clearing, excavation, demolition, or redevelopment activities that may be directly returned to the economic mainstream in the form of raw materials for reuse at other sites (most often soils); or in the case of construction/demolition activities, materials (brick, block, concrete) source separated at the point of generation, may then returned to the economic mainstream as aggregate substitute (fill). If the brick, block or concrete requires further processing (usually for size reduction) and is shipped to a NJDEP-permitted Class B Recycling Facility, then these materials are not considered soil and fill materials and, for purposes of business licensure, provided the business generating/handling/transporting this material exclusively ships all its materials to Class B facilities, they are not required to register, obtain a license or a non-restricted soil/fill materials certification. This also includes petroleum contaminated soils generated/handled/transported to Class B facilities specifically approved to accept these soils. Virgin quarry products including rock, stone, gravel, sand, clay and other mined products are also not considered soil/fill materials for purposes of licensure and similarly, provided the business exclusively handles only these virgin quarry materials, they are not required to register, obtain a license or a non-restricted soil and fill materials certification.
- Certain businesses that <u>exclusively</u> handle soil and fill recyclable materials that, while not containing debris, are chemically contaminated to the level that they meet the definition of a solid waste (determined per N.J.A.C. 7:26-1.6(a)6 to contain concentrations of one or more contaminants that exceed the residential soil remediation standards identified therein), but can be reused at certain locations (commonly referred to as 'restricted use' soil and fill material), are also <u>not</u> required to obtain a license or certificate provided they have approved <u>beneficial use determinations (BUDs)</u> from the NJDEP for any and all of their activities and/or locations. While there are few, if any, current businesses that exclusively handle only these beneficially approved soils and fills, particular usage activities include using the material as alternative daily cover material at operating landfills, to close terminated landfills or to remediate certain contaminated sites. A listing of other categorically approved materials and uses can be found at N.J.A.C. 7:26-1.7(g)4(i-x).
- As emphasized above when discussing 'exclusivity', it is important to remember that determination of the
 applicability of this law is based on business operations/activities taken as a whole and not based solely
 on a particular event or transport activity. It is assumed most businesses engaged in soil and fill recycling
 services, with the exception of businesses handling de-minimis (low volume) quantities of non-restricted
 soil and fill recyclable materials, will require a license or certification.
- Businesses engaged in soil and fill services involving asphalt millings are subject to this law excepting
 businesses that exclusively provide the millings to asphalt manufacturing plants for use as feedstock for
 production of new asphalt.
- Degree/Penalties for engaging in soil and fill recycling services without a license:
 - Pursuant to N.J.S.A.13:1E-135.5 17g, any person who engages in soil and fill recycling services without a registration issued pursuant to section 1 of P.L.2019, c.397 (C.13:1E-127.1), or a soil and fill recycling license issued pursuant to section 8 of P.L.1983, c.392 (C.13:1E-133), as

appropriate, or who knowingly makes any false or misleading statement to the department or the Attorney General in connection with a registration or license, shall, upon conviction, be guilty of a crime of the **third degree** and, notwithstanding the provisions of N.J.S.2C:43-3, shall be subject to a fine of not more than **\$50,000.00** for the first offense and not more than **\$100,000.00** for the second and each subsequent offense and restitution, in addition to any other appropriate disposition authorized by subsection b. of N.J.S.2C:43-2.

- Pursuant to N.J.S.A.13:1E-135.5 17h, any person who collects, transports, treats, stores, brokers, transfers, or disposes of solid waste or hazardous waste, or that engages in soil and fill recycling services, shall furnish the appropriate license or registration upon the request of any law enforcement officer or any agent of the department, a local board of health, or a county health department.
- As per <u>N.J.S.A</u>.13:1E-135.5 17i, pursuit of any remedy specified in the law shall not preclude the pursuit of any other remedy provided by any other law. Administrative and judicial remedies provided in this law may be pursued simultaneously.

EPA Announces New Drinking Water Health Advisories for PFAS Chemicals



On Wednesday, June 15, the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) released four drinking water health advisories for per- and polyfluoroalkyl substances (PFAS) in the latest action under President Biden's action plan to deliver clean water and Administrator Regan's PFAS Strategic Roadmap. EPA's health advisories are non-enforceable and non-regulatory and provide technical information to drinking water system operators, as well as federal, state, tribal, and local officials on health effects, analytical methodologies, and treatment technologies associated with drinking water contamination.

NJDEP applauds this important step in the movement toward national drinking water standards. NJDEP experts will carefully review these new federal health advisories in the context of New Jersey's existing programs and take all appropriate steps to ensure the delivery of safe drinking water throughout the state while working diligently to hold the manufacturers that released these PFAS accountable.

Commissioner LaTourette Attends Facility Opening for All-Electric Ambulances Coming to New Jersey 🚑

Furthering the Murphy Administration's commitment to reduce air pollution in overburdened communities, NJDEP Commissioner LaTourette helped unveil the prototype of an electric ambulance that will be purchased with New Jersey Regional Greenhouse Gas Initiative auction proceeds and housed in the City of Paterson.

Ambulances typically drive approximately 4,000 hours and idle for more than 2,000 hours because they must always be ready to go out on calls. For each hour spent idling, a typical ambulance burns 1.17 gallons of diesel, producing more than 20 pounds of greenhouse gases. Bringing the electric ambulances to New Jersey will have significant benefits and emissions reductions for the City of Paterson, Passaic County and surrounding neighborhoods including Clifton, Haledon, North Haledon, Prospect Park, Totowa, and the William Paterson University area.

To further leverage its <u>RGGI</u> auction proceeds, the DEP applied for and has been awarded approximately \$1 million in federal <u>Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality</u> funds for idle-reduction technology projects specific to police cars and ambulances.

The New Jersey Department of Community Affairs (DCA) today announced that its Division of Housing and Community Resources (DHCR) will be accepting pre-applications online for the State Rental Assistance Program (SRAP) Waiting List. Pre-applications will be accepted to enter a lottery for the statewide SRAP program in the Elderly, Family, Disabled, and Homeless categories.

Elderly applicants must serve as head of household and be 62 years of age or older. For those applying in the Family category, the head of household must be 18 years of age or an emancipated minor, with or without children. To qualify in the Disabled category, the head of household or spouse must be permanently disabled. Homeless applicants must lack a fixed, regular, and adequate nighttime residence.

All pre-applications submitted online during the open enrollment period from Monday, July 11, 2022, at 9:00 a.m. until Friday, July 22, 2022, at 5:00 p.m., will be entered into a database and a lottery system will be used to select applicants for the waiting lists. Pre- applications for SRAP assistance will be accepted from very low-income households. Applicants

must be eighteen (18) years of age or older to apply or be an emancipated minor. Morris County Small Business Grant Program Continues to Deliver

Canine Country Club of the Lake was the latest to receive a \$15,000 Morris County Small Business Grant Program check, delivered today by the Morris County Board of County Commissioners.

Commissioner Director Tayfun Selen and Commissioner Stephen Shaw presented the check to Jodi Brooks, owner of the canine day care and boarding business off Tierney Road in Jefferson Township. Mayor Eric Wilsusen and Business Administrator Debra Millikin joined the presentation and tour of Canine Country Club.

"When COVID hit, people stayed home. They didn't go on vacation. They didn't even go into work. So their dogs stayed home with them. The boarding side of my business almost completely shut down, and I focused on keeping my employees here and working," said Brooks, noting the challenges her business faced.

Canine Country Club has been in business since 2012, and Brooks had expanded into other animal-related services, enabling her to keep on some employees while meeting mounting expenses after 2020 and through last year. The day-care and kennel, which currently has a capacity for 89 dogs, has been able to regain many of its loyal patrons.

Some of the facility's canine tenants were at the center today, audibly greeting the public officials who visited and toured the facility.

About \$2 million remains in the Morris County Small Business Program, which the Commissioners created and launched on Feb. 14, Valentine's Day, with \$10 million in American Rescue Plan Act funds. Most successful applicants have received the full \$15,000 permitted in the grant program, and the Commissioners continue to **personally deliver some of the checks** to let small business owners know the programs remains active.

"Small business owners and nonprofits need to go to the website, read the qualifications and apply. There is nothing to lose aside from an investment of time to gather the appropriate business documents and fill out the application. It is well worth the effort," said Director Selen.

Morris County Small Business Grant Aides Washington Township Market

The historic Schooley's Mountain General Store, New Jersey's oldest, continuously operating country market, received a \$15,000 Morris County Small Business Grant Program check today.

"It's absolutely going to help. It's going to help me get back to where I belong, get me back in the right direction and hopefully get the ball rolling again," said **Peter Aldrich**, **owner of the General Store since 2006**.

Morris County Commissioner Deputy Director John Krickus presented the grant to Aldrich along with Washington Township Mayor Matt Murello during a visit and tour of the store, which was originally opened around 1803. Located in the heart of one of the township's most historic areas, the store and the region has been visited by U.S. Presidents over the years, including Ulysses S. Grant, William Henry Harrison and Franklin D. Roosevelt.

Old photographs of the General Store through the ages adorn the old building, which has had many names, but continued to operate as a market and deli, and continues to house one of the region's oldest Post Offices. However, Aldrich said the store struggled after the pandemic hit in 2020, was forced to close for a time and barely survived.

"Things just disappeared, like when everyone stopped going to work, my breakfast business disappeared; the evening business disappeared. We were basically surviving on our lunch business. ... And we still have a ways to go," Aldrich said.

He credited Mayor Murello for altering him to the Morris County Small Business Grant Program, which the Morris County Board of County Commissioners created on Valentine's Day with the slogan, "Morris County Loves Small Business." The program was developed using \$10 million in American Rescue Plan Act dollars received by the county

"We really appreciate someone like yourself hanging in there. We know it it's been really, really tough – and we made this one of our priorities," said **Commissioner Krickus** of launching the small business grant program.

"We're really glad you applied, and congratulations," Krickus added.

About \$2 million remains in the Morris County Small Business Program, which has provided most successful applicants the maximum \$15,000 permitted in the grant program. The Commissioners continue to **personally deliver some of the checks** to let small business owners, as well as nonprofits know the program remains active.

Morris County & Arts Community Unveil Plaque to Viki Craig

Late Co-Founder of "Art in the Atrium" Championed African American Art

Art in the Atrium (ATA) Co-founder Viki Craig was honored tonight with a plaque unveiled in Morristown by the **Morris County Board of County Commissioners**, **The Craig Family** and **Morris Arts** during a ceremony at the Morris County Administration and Records Building in Morristown, where ATA began 30 years ago.

Charles Craig and Lauren LeBeaux Craig, Viki Craig's husband and daughter, hosted the ceremony with Morris Arts Director of Galleries Lynn Seibert and Morris County Commissioner Deputy Director John Krickus next to the plaque on the 5th Floor of the Atrium Gallery.

"It's been three years since we lost Viki Craig and two years since we first planned a dedication here to this wonderful, brilliant and visionary woman, and I want to say thank you to Charles and Lauren for continuing her legacy. ... It is so fitting that we are going to have Viki Craig's plaque here, overlooking the atrium where she founded Art in the Atrium," said **Commissioner Krickus.**

He noted that Morris County has only two other plaques of honor on the 5th Floor of the atrium: One for Frederick W. Knox, Jr., who served as a Freeholder from 1978 to 1988, and the other to Ilene St. John, who served as Clerk of the Board from 1991 to 2008.

"I am just so proud to represent my parents who had the vision and tenacity to keep this going for all these years. And I am excited that my mom has her plaque, and I'm trying not to get emotional too early. It's a culmination of just so much," said Lauren LeBeaux Craig.

The plaque is located just outside the Morris County Commissioners public meeting room. ATA took its name from the county's five-story building atrium, where the Craig Family launched their nonprofit volunteer art organization with the mission to educate and **exhibit African American fine art in Morristown**.

The plaque unveiling was timed to coincide with **Juneteenth celebrations** this weekend, which honors the date **June 19**, **1865**, two months after the Civil War ended, when Union General Gordon Granger delivered the news to **enslaved communities in Texas that they had been freed** by the Emancipation Proclamation two and a half years earlier.

ATA's annual exhibition, the largest of its kind in the state of New Jersey, has been a successful showcase of art by both emerging and established artists. Viki Craig died in December 2018, but her family continued her work.

During 2020 and 2021, when the COVID-19 pandemic made it impossible to keep the Atrium Gallery open to the public, a planned plaque dedication to Viki Craig was postponed. But ATA still showcased its artists virtually with the support of Morris County and the Board of Commissioners.

This year, ATA's atrium exhibit is part of Morris Arts' new exhibit, REEMERGENCE AND RENEWAL, which was set up last month and will run through Sept. 2. It exhibits a total of 138 artworks by 46 talented artists who offer a sense of renewal through their vibrant imagery, vivid colors, compelling designs and their underlying sense of humanity.

The fourth and fifth floors of the atrium exclusively showcase **ATA's presentation -- 70 works by 24 African American artists entitled "Black Revival!"** The works include a wide range of styles and media – utilizing acrylic, multimedia assemblages, textiles, and photos in abstract and figurative compositions.

Most of the artworks are available for sale, with details and pricing provided in the free catalogues available in the elevator lobby areas on each floor. The catalogue also is available online at www.morrisarts.org.

The Atrium Art Gallery is free and open to the public during business hours, 8:30 am-4:30 p.m.

Morris Arts is a not-for-profit organization founded in 1973 dedicated to building community through the arts. Using the arts to inspire, connect and engage, Morris Arts serves as a resource for Morris County with a special focus on arts programming in the community and in the schools, arts advocacy, and support of the Morris Area community of artists and arts organizations.



Morris County Grant Program Brings Sunshine to Four Small Businesses on the First Day of Summer

Checks Personally Delivered to Shop Owners in Denville & Boonton

On the longest day of the year, the **Morris County Board of County Commissioners delivered small business grants** in the shortest time yet during a one-hour tour of Denville and Boonton.

Morris County Commissioner Stephen Shaw presented the first of four Morris County Small Business Grant Program check this morning to Jane Di Maria of Jane's Hair Salon on Route 46 West in Denville. Her business had to close for three months in 2020, and struggled to regain clientele in the years that followed.

"Thank you. It's great to be surviving it all. This helps," Di Maria said, after receiving a check for more than \$6,000.

Salons, spas and other personal care, grooming and exercise businesses faced heavy losses even after the state-ordered lockdowns were lifted in 2020, as social-distancing requirements forced many to reduce the number of customers permitted inside their operations.

"Thank you," said Suyoung Jun, owner of Nail Xpressions at Hawkins Place plaza in Boonton, noting his business still had to pay rent while working through a downturn in customers. He received a \$15,000 grant.

"New Jersey lost a third of its small businesses. We created this grant program to help those who survived and who are struggling to survive," Commissioner Shaw told the grant recipients during his visits today.

Morris County Commissioners have been delivering some of the grant checks to continue **raising awareness of a program that still has more than \$2 million** in grants available.

In talking with some business owners, Shaw noted that many survived by spending through savings and "cushion" funds designed to carry them through the normal course of a business year. The pandemic and aftermath challenged small business owners with much longer periods of losses.

"That was the problem," said **Bill Bottino of Four 3 Performance Laboratory Corp.**, a physical therapy business off **Woonton Street in Boonton**.

The company not only closed during the shutdown, but saw clientele visits drop whenever a COVID-19 spike was reported. **The company qualified for a full \$15,000 grant.**

"We bled out so much money after that, just trying to keep the doors open, and we were not busy enough to cover the bills. Every payroll was getting chewed away. So this is the best time ever to have something to replenish all that," Bottino explained.

Laurel Durenberger, owner of the antique and vintage gift shop called **Time's Tin Cup** on Main Street in Boonton, also **qualified for a full \$15,000 grant**.

She noted that her business was shut down for four months during the pandemic, yet she still needed to pay her rent and eventually moved to her current location.

"It's been like a trauma. But I survived," she said, noting her grant will help, in part, to cover the cost of shelves required to clearly display her merchandise in the smaller, new space.

The Morris County Board of County Commissioners created and launched the grant program on Feb. 14, Valentine's Day, with \$10 million in American Rescue Plan Act funds and announcing Morris County Loves Small Business.

Small businesses and nonprofits alike are invited to apply. Most successful applicants have received the full \$15,000 permitted in the grant program.

Morris County Ranks in Top 25 Healthiest Communities in America

Health Study Released by U.S. News & World Report Reaffirms Past Studies

Morris County ranked among "The 25 Healthiest Communities in America" in a new analysis of health and wellness in 3,000 communities across the United States released today by U.S. News & World Report in collaboration with CVS Health.

The <u>"Healthiest Communities"</u> report is the fifth annual analysis conducted by U.S. News & World Report with **Morris County consistently ranking among the top**. The new report ranked <u>Morris County 16th nationwide and first in New Jersey</u>, just after the county was ranked healthiest in New

Jersey in a separate national study <u>released in April</u> by the University of Wisconsin Population Health Institute and the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation.

"This is wonderful news. Morris County is continuously ranking among the top healthiest places to live in America, and as these studies repeatedly underscore, there are important factors that contribute to these findings," said **Tayfun Selen**, **Director of the Morris County Board of County Commissioners**.

"All of these studies cite our excellent economy and employment opportunities. They note the strength of our education system as well as our residents' access to health care and healthy lifestyles, and our access to parks and green spaces. These are aspects of Morris County that all of us in the public and private sectors have worked over the decades to maintain and improve, and I believe these reports inspire us to continue our efforts to make Morris County the best place to live, work and raise a family," **Director Selen added.**

The Healthiest Communities rankings from U.S. News & World Report evaluates 89 factors that fuel and form the health of residents across nearly 3,000 U.S. counties and county equivalents. Counties were assessed on a 100-point scoring system tied to how they perform relative to one another across 10 health-related categories, ranging from education and the economy to community vitality, equity, infrastructure and public safety. They receive a ranking based on their performance as well.

The broad framework of categories and subcategories was based on factors key to evaluating community health that were identified by the <u>National Committee on Vital and Health Statistics</u> – a policy advisory board to the head of the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services – as part of its <u>Measurement Framework for Community Health and Well-Being</u>. U.S. News adapted the NCVHS model in consultation with leading population health experts, resulting most notably in the inclusion of an equity category.

Morris County Considers 30 Historic Sites for Preservation Funding

Five First-Time Projects Included in Recommendations for \$2.65 Million in Grants

The Morris County Board of County Commissioners was asked last night to approve \$2.65 million in grants from the county's Preservation Trust Fund to help restore, preserve and further protect 30 historic sites, including five that were never submitted for review in the past.

Morris County has awarded 482 grants amounting to nearly \$43.3 Million to assist in the preservation, protection and respond to form of 117 historical properties since 2003, when grants were first issued for protecting historic sites through Morris Preservation Trust Fund. The sites are located in 34 towns around Morris County.

Most of the funding recommended by the **Morris County Historic Preservation Trust Fund Review Board**, about 83 percent, is slated for construction proposals involving 15 of the projects. The rest, 17 percent, is being recommended for non-construction activity at 15 other historic sites, where the funding is earmarked for preservation planning, pre-construction planning and design work.

"These are only recommendations and our Board of Commissioners will make a final determination at a meeting in July after we have been able to examine the projects. However, we must thank the Preservation Trust Fund Review Board and our Office of Planning and Preservation for the extensive work they put into reviewing each historic site submitted for funding consideration and making the hard decisions on which ones to recommend for funding this year," said **Commissioner Director Tayfun Selen.**

"Stepping back to look at where we have been from 2003 to 2021, recapping 19 funding cycles, the number of grants awarded has been 482 grants over those years. The total amount awarded has been \$43,295,925. The number of historic sites awarded is 117, and that's different from the 482 because we have had repeat sites awarded over the years," said **Larry Fast, Chair of the Review Board**, noting grants often go to fund stages of a single preservation effort.

The five new projects submitted for consideration by the Review Board were recommended for full funding. They include:

- The Boonton Civil War Memorial in the Town of Boonton
- Dr. John Taylor House in the Town of Boonton
- Samuel Tuttle House in Hanover Township
- The Lindenwold Mansion (Peck School Building) in Morristown
- The Mountain Lakes Train Station in Mountain Lakes


Another noteworthy project recommended for full funding this year is restoring five metal fireplace hoods inside the Log House at the Stickley Museum at Craftsman Farms, a National Historic Landmark. Craftsman Farms is the former country estate of noted turn-of-the-century designer Gustav Stickley, a major proponent of the Arts and Crafts movement in decorative arts, home building and furnishing styles. The fireplace hoods each carry unique sayings imprinted on the metal, including one ancient maxim: "The lyf so short. The craft so long to lerne." Complete with unique spelling choices, the slogan was used by Geoffrey Chaucer in the 14th Century and Stickley used it as a motto for a magazine he published called "The Craftsman."





(the "Company") filed a Petition with the Board of Public Utilities (the "Board" or "BPU") of the State of New Jersey seeking approval of a Foundational Filing to implement a Distribution System Improvement Charge ("DSIC"), pursuant to N.J.A.C. 14:9-10.1 et seq. A DSIC is a rate recovery mechanism to encourage and support accelerated rehabilitation and replacement of certain non-revenue producing, critical water distribution components. Such projects include main replacement and renewal, structural and non-structural main cleaning and lining projects, and the renewal of valves, hydrants and service connections. Its purpose is to enhance safety, reliability, water quality, systems flows and pressure, and/or conservation. A DSIC rate is interim, subject to refund, until the subsequent base rate case.

The Company's petition consists of a Foundational Filing. The Foundational Filing lists the projects the Company believes are eligible for recovery through the DSIC surcharge for the period of 2022 through 2025. Please note that the Company proposes to collect a maximum DSIC revenue requirement of no more than 5.0% of the utility's total water revenues established in the

Company's most recent base rate case. The Company will implement the DSIC surcharge if, and when, it achieves specific levels of infrastructure investment and completes and places the facilities into service as required by N.J.A.C. 14:9-10.1 et seq.

The Company has proposed that the monthly DSIC surcharge be assessed to the following services and classes of customers based on the customer's meter size: General Metered Service; Optional Industrial Wholesale; and Sales for Resale, as provided throughout the State of New Jersey. The maximum proposed rates shown below are expected to be assessed incrementally over a two-to-three year period, commensurate with the Company's actual DSIC program capital spending.

Any relief determined by the Board to be just and reasonable may be allocated by the Board to any class or classes of customers of the Company in such manner and, in such amounts or percentages, as the Board may deem appropriate. The Board may choose to impose a greater portion of the increase on any present or future class or classes, group or groups of customers, may exclude from any increase any of the foregoing, or may vary the amount of percentage increase applicable to any of the foregoing. The maximum proposed monthly DSIC rates are contained in the petition filed with the Board, as set forth below. The maximum revenues will be set in the Company's currently pending base rate case, BPU Docket No. WR22010019.

"(i) Acquisition of personal protection equipment for Budd Lake Fire Department, a brush truck for Flanders Fire Department, laptops, tablets and Wi-Fi for Flanders Rescue Squad and a controlled air purifying respirator system and an ambulance for Budd Lake Rescue Squad, including all related costs and expenditures incidental thereto.

Section Two. Section 3(e)(ii) of Bond Ordinance #7-2022 of the Township, is hereby amended to include the acquisition of an ambulance and to read as follows:

"(ii) Replacement of Engine 53 and the acquisition of pagers for Budd Lake Fire Department, radios for Flanders Rescue Squad and an ambulance, radios, pagers and an ultra-violet light for Budd Lake Rescue Squad, including all related costs and expenditures incidental thereto."

Section Three. The Township hereby certifies that it has adopted a capital budget or a temporary capital budget, as applicable. The capital or temporary capital budget of the Township is hereby amended to conform with the provisions of this ordinance to the extent of any inconsistency herewith. To the extent that the purposes authorized herein

ORDINANCE #20-2022

AN ORDINANCE OF THE TOWNSHIP OF MOUNT OLIVE, IN THE COUNTY OF MORRIS AND STATE OF NEW JERSEY, AMENDING SECTION 550-23 OF THE TOWNSHIP CODE TO UPDATE AND CLARIFY ZONING PERMIT AND CERTIFICATE OF OCCUPANCY REQUIREMENTS

WHEREAS, Section 550-23 of the Township of Mount Olive Code sets forth requirements for zoning permits and certificates of occupancy; and

WHEREAS, the Township Planner and Administration have recommended updating and clarifying the requirements.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the Township Council of the Township of Mount Olive, in the County of Morris and State of New Jersey, as follows:

SECTION 1. Chapter 550, Land Use, Article III, General Administration; Building Construction; Permits, Section 550-23, Zoning permits and certificates of occupancy; fees, is hereby amended to read as follows in its entirety:

§ 550-23 Zoning permits and certificates of occupancy; fees.

- A. No zoning permit, building permit or certificate of occupancy shall be issued for any parcel of land or structure which was sold or on which improvements were undertaken in violation of the provisions of this chapter or for use of a lot which was created by subdivision after the effective date of and not in conformity with the provisions of this chapter. No site improvements, such as but not limited to additions, patios, decks, fences, detached garages, sheds, excavation or construction of public or private improvements, shall be commenced except in conformance with this chapter in accordance with plat approvals and the issuance of required permits, including a zoning permit, and/or where applicable, a soil and fill importation permit pursuant to Chapter 334 of the Township Code. [Amended 10-5-2010 by Ord. No. 23-2010; 10-28-2014 by Ord. No. 22-2014]
- B. A zoning permit shall be issued by the Zoning Officer before the issuance of either a certificate of occupancy to a new occupant of an existing non-residential building or portions of an existing building or before the issuance of a building permit or certificate of occupancy.
- C. It shall be unlawful to use or permit the use of any building or part thereof hereafter created, erected, changed, converted, altered or enlarged, wholly or in part, until a certificate of occupancy shall have been issued by the Construction Code Official; and no certificate shall be issued unless the land, building(s), accessory buildings and structures, and use thereof comply with this chapter and is preceded by issuance of a zoning permit or by a memorialized resolution of approval by the Mount Olive Planning Board; all matters incorporated on the approved subdivision or site plan have been completed and certified by the Township Engineer; and the building and health

codes are complied with.

- D. Each request for a zoning permit and a certificate of occupancy shall be accompanied by a check payable to the Township of Mount Olive in the amount of \$25 for a residential zoning permit and \$100 for a nonresidential zoning permit. [Amended 6-15-2004 by Ord. No. 12-2004; 10-5-2010 by Ord. No. 23-2010]
- E. Where subject property is governed by rules and regulations of an association, the zoning permit application shall include documentation that said association has authorized the submission of the application for the proposed use and/or site improvement(s). [Added 11-10-2020 by Ord. No. 21-2020]

SECTION 2. If any section, subsection, clause, or phrase of this Ordinance is for any reason held to be unconstitutional or invalid by any court of competent jurisdiction, such decision shall not affect the remaining portions of the Ordinance.

SECTION 3. All ordinances or parts of ordinances of the Township of Mount Olive that are inconsistent herewith are repealed to the extent of such inconsistency.

SECTION 4. This Ordinance shall take effect twenty (20) days following final passage, approval, and publication as required by law.
